Course Description:

This course aims to study American literature from its beginnings to 1865 and help students develop a greater understanding of American history, culture, and society. We will discuss and evaluate the chosen literary works carefully and critically, paying special attention to how they represent some of the most influential American literary themes and traditions. Students are required to give one group presentation and at least three short individual presentations. In addition, they are expected to come to class prepared and participate vigorously in class discussions.
